- Target-undershoot in vowel production is, at least for some speakers, not caused by mechanical limitations of the articulators (this thesis).
- The effects of speaking rate on vowel production are different from those of 'other' styles of speaking (this thesis).
- The importance of the (immediate) context is underrated in current experiments on vowel identification (this thesis).
- If your experiment needs statistics, you ought to have done a better experiment (attributed to E. Rutherford).
- A theory that explains all the facts is bound to be wrong because some of the facts will be wrong (attributed to F. Crick).
- Never believe a fact before it has been confirmed by theory (attributed to Eddington).
